2010 OFFICIAL RULES, RECORDS & QUALIFYING STANDARDS

ARCHERY

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Archery competitions sanctioned by WASUSA are conducted in accordance with International Archery Federation (FITA) rules.

The FITA rulebook is available through the National Archery Association:

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1. TARGET ARCHERY

- 1.1. Wheelchair target archery is conducted in accordance with International Archery Federation (FITA) rules. To be thoroughly versed in wheelchair target archery, one should be familiar with this section of the Wheelchair and Ambulatory Sports, USA Rulebook as well as the FITA Rulebook available through the National Archery Association. The following are most of the rules governing equipment that may be used in wheelchair competition. (The FITA dress code will not be enforced.) The wearing of white is preferred and strongly recommended
- 1.2. Wheelchair Archery recognizes the following divisions:
 - Women
 - Men
 - Junior Men
 - Junior Women
 - Master's Women
 - Master's Men
- 1.3. Each of the classes identified above have the following classifications
 - AR 1 (Quadripegia)
 - AR 2 (Paraplegia)
 - AR 3 (Standing)
 - Open Compound (Any level of function) equipment as defined by FITA.
- 1.4. Competitors (excluding AR1's) are grouped in separate divisions and compete in separate events when using different types of equipment (compound, recurve, or compound with bowstand (only in Junior Division at WASUSA event), or recurve with bowstand (only in Junior Division at WASUSA event)).
- 1.5. Separate events for junior nationals and master's nationals can be recognized.
- 1.6. A competitor may participate in a junior class in a tournament when the competition takes place in a year in which his 21st birthday is dated.
- 1.7. A junior competitor may chose to compete in the senior class at his/her discretion.
- 1.8. A competitor may participate in a master's class in tournaments when the competition takes place in the year in which his 50th birthday is dated.

2. COMPETITOR'S EQUIPMENT GENERAL REGULATIONS

2.1. RECURVE

For the Recurve Bow Division, the following equipment is permitted:

- 2.1.1. For the Paralympic Division, the following items are permitted: (same regulations for Olympic Division, FITA Rulebook 7.3.1.1). A BOW of any type may be used provided it subscribes to the accepted principle and

meaning of the word Bow as used in Target Archery: e.g., an instrument consisting of a handle (grip), riser, and two flexible limbs each ending in a tip with a string nock.

The Bow is braced for use by a single bowstring attached directly between the two string nocks only, and in operation is held in one hand by its handle (grip) while the fingers of the other hand draw, hold back, and release the string.

2.1.1.1. AR 1 archers have the option to use a compound or recurve bow; a release or fingers or any combination of the above. Refer to the compound bow division for the definition of the compound bow and release. However, the sighting device may not incorporate a lens or leveling device of any kind. A string peep is also not permitted. See section 2.4.1

2.1.2. A BOW STRING may be made by any number of strands of the material chosen for the purpose, with a center serving to accommodate the drawing fingers, a nocking point to which may be added serving(s) to fit the arrow nock as necessary, and to locate this point one or two locators may be positioned, and in each of the two ends of the bow string a loop to be placed in the string necks of the bow when braced. In addition, one attachment is permitted on the string to serve as lip or nose mark. The serving on the string must not end within the archer's vision at full draw. A bow string must not in any way offer aid in aiming through "peephole", marking, or any other means.

2.1.3. An ARROWREST which can be adjustable, any moveable pressurebottom, pressure point, or arrowplate may be used on the bow provided it is not electric or electronic and do not offer any additional aid in aiming. The pressure point shall be placed no further than 4 cm back (inside) from the throat of the handle (pivot point) of the bow. A DRAW CHECK INDICATOR, audible and/or visible, other than electric or electronic may be used.

2.1.4. A BOWSIGHT, or bowmark for aiming is permitted, but at no time may more than one such device be used.

2.1.4.1. A bowsight for the purpose of aiming which may allow for windage adjustments as well as elevation setting is subject to the following provisions:

2.1.4.1.1. It shall not incorporate a prism or lens or any other magnifying device, leveling or electric or electronic device, nor shall it provide more than one sighting point.

2.1.4.1.2. An extension to which the bowsight is fixed is permitted.

2.1.4.1.3. A bowmark is a single mark on the bow for the purpose of aiming. Such mark may be made in pencil, tape, or any suitable marking material.

2.1.4.1.4. A plate or tape with distance marking may be mounted on the bow as a guide for marking, but must not in any way offer additional aid.

2.1.4.1.5. Open compound may have a magnified lens, leveling

device, and string peep.

2.1.5. STABILIZERS on the bow are permitted provided they do not:

2.1.5.1. Serve as a string guide.

2.1.5.2. Touch anything but the bow

2.1.5.3. Represent any obstacle to other archers as far as place on the shooting line is concerned. TORQUE FLIGHT COMPENSATORS (TFC) may also be mounted.

2.1.6. ARROWS of any type may be used provided they subscribe to the accepted principle and meaning of the word arrow as used in Target Archery and that such arrows do not cause undue damage to target faces and buttresses.

An arrow consists of a nock, shaft, and arrow head (point) with **fletching** and, if desired, cresting.

ARROWS. The arrows of each archer shall be marked on the shaft with the archers name or initials and all arrows used for the same end of 3 or 6 arrows shall carry the same pattern and color(s) of fletching necks and cresting, if any.

2.1.7. FINGER PROTECTIONS, in the form of finger stalls or tips, gloves, shooting tab or tape (plaster) to draw, hold back and release the string, are permitted, provided they do not incorporate any device to help hold and/or release the String.

A SEPARATOR between the fingers to prevent pinching may be used. On the bow hand an ordinary glove, mitten, or similar hand covering may be worn.

2.1.8. FIELD GLASSES, TELESCOPES, and other visual aids may be used for spotting arrows.

ORDINARY SPECTACLES as necessary or SHOOTING SPECTACLES provided they are fitted with the same lens normally used by the archer, or SUN GLASSES are permitted. None must be fitted with microhole lenses, glasses, or similar, nor marked in any way, which can assist in aiming.

2.1.9. ACCESSORIES are permitted such as bracers, dress shield, bowsling, belt or ground quiver, tassel, foot marker not protruding above the ground more than one centimeter.

2.1.10. BOWSTAND This division allows the archer to use a device to hold the bow. The archers' disability leaves them with functional use of only one side of their body or archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position. The bow device must hold the bow vertical to the target. A recurved or compound bow may be used. Compound Bow Division rules apply. This division is only allowed in a Junior Division at a WASUSA event.

2.1.11. Archery officials will be assessing all equipment to ensure they subscribe to the accepted principle.

2.2. COMPOUND

For the Compound Bow Division, the following equipment is permitted:

- 2.2.1. For the compound bow division and for AR1 definition of Compound Bow, the following equipment is described. Generally speaking, all types of additional devices, unless they are electronic or electric, are permitted with the limitations given below.
- 2.2.2. A Compound bow, where the draw is mechanically varied by a system of pulleys and/or cams. The peak draw weight must not exceed 60 pounds. The bow is braced for use by either a single bowstring attached directly between the two string nock of the bow limbs, or attached to the bow cable, as may be applicable to the particular design. Cable guards are permitted.
- 2.2.3. A bowstring of any number of strands of the material chosen for the purpose, with a center serving to accommodate the drawing fingers or release aid. A nocking point may be fitted to which may be added servings to fit the arrow nock as necessary. To locate this point one or two nock locators may be fitted. In addition, attachments are permitted on the string to serve as a lip mark, a nose mark, a peep-hole, a peep-hole 'hold-in-line' device.
- 2.2.4. An arrow rest, which can be adjustable, any movable pressure button point or arrow plate, may all be used on the bow provided that they are not electric or electronic. The Pressure point shall be placed no further than 6 cm back (inside) from the throat of the handle (pivot point of the bow).
- 2.2.5. Draw check indicators, audible and/or visual, other than electric or electronic, may be used.
- 2.2.6. A bowsight attached to the bow, which may allow for windage adjustment as well as elevation setting which may also incorporate a leveling device, and may incorporate magnifying lenses and/or prisms. It may provide only one sight point on the device. An extension to which the bowsight is fixed is permitted. The sight point may be a fiber optic sight pin and/or a chemical glowstick. The glowstick will be encased as not to disturb other athletes and to provide only one sight point. Electric or electronic devices are not permitted.
- 2.2.7. Stabilizers and torque flight compensators, provided they do not:
 - serve as a string guide;
 - touch anything but the bow;
 - represent any obstacle to other Archers as far as place on the shooting line is concerned.
- 2.2.7.1. Arrows of any type may be used provided that they subscribe to the accepted principle and meaning of the word arrow as used in Target Archery, and that such arrows do not cause undue damage to

target faces and buttresses. An arrow consists of a shaft with head (point), nock, fletchings and, if desired, cresting. The arrows of each archer shall be marked on the shaft with the archer's name or initials, and all arrows used for the same end of three or six arrows shall carry the same pattern and color of fletching, nocks, and cresting, if any.

- 2.2.8. Finger protections in the form of finger stalls or tips, gloves, shooting tab or taps (plaster) to draw, hold back and release the string. A separator between the fingers to prevent pinching the arrow may be used. An anchor plate or similar device attached to the finger protection (tab) for the purpose of anchoring is permitted. A release aid that must not be attached in any way to the bow nor incorporate electric or electronic devices. On the bow hand, an ordinary glove, mitten, or similar item may be worn.
- 2.2.9. Field glasses, telescopes, and other visual aids may be used. Ordinary spectacles as necessary or shooting spectacles and sunglasses. None must be fitted with microhole lenses, glasses, or similar, nor marked in any way which can assist in aiming. The glass of the non sighting eye may be fully covered or taped, or an eye patch may be used.
- 2.2.10. Accessories are permitted such as bracers, dress shield, bowsling, belt or ground quiver, tassel.

3. CLASSIFICATION

3.1. CLASS AR 1

Defined as tetraplegic archers in a wheelchair. The archer with upper cervical lesions, with triceps not functional against resistance (i.e. test grades 0-3) and the archer with lower cervical lesions, with good normal triceps power (i.e. test grades 4-5), wrist extensors and flexors, but having no fingers flexors or extensors of functional value (i.e. below grade 3 on the muscle test scale), may use a release, compound or recurved bow, strapping and body support. All AR1 archers are allowed to use a compound or recurved bow; a release or finger or any combination of the above. The equipment will be standard FITA equipment rules with the exception of the addition of the release and compound bow.

The sighting aids must be according to current FITA shooting rules, A) outdoor target archery, article 504, archer's equipment, (a) (v).

Class A1 formerly classes 1A - 1B - 1C.

- 3.1.1. Archers who use a mechanical release may receive assistance in putting arrows on their bows.

3.2. CLASS AR 2

An open class for wheelchair archers. The archers use equipment according to FITA rules. For AR 2 division, there must be no more than 15 cm slackness in the back upholstery of the wheelchair to be measured from the front of the main vertical support of the chair back. No strapping to the chair is allowed in the AR 2 classification. The height, of body support, from the top of the chair to the armpit shall be no less than 11 cm.

3.3. CLASS AR 3

A Standing Division for Disabled Archers will be permitted at some Wheelchair Archery, USA sanctioned events. Contact Wheelchair Sports, USA for referral to Wheelchair Archery, USA Chairperson.

4. TARGET ARCHERY EVENTS ADULTS

Single archery rounds may be shot at qualifying events.

The Novice Round is open to those who are in their first year of archery training and/or competition. This includes any training or competition prior to shooting in a wheelchair. The Double Short Metric, the Double Advanced Metric, or the Double FITA may be shot by any archer including the first year shooters, if they prefer. A competitor may enter only one championship round. Novice Round, Double Short Metric and the Double Advanced Metric, rounds are not recognized by NAA or FITA as competition rounds.

4.1. FITA Round

At Outdoor Target Championships, the Tournament Field may be used by the competitors for practice on all the days of the competition at times arranged by the Organizers. However, all practice must cease fifteen (15) minutes before competition starts.

For distances of 90, 70, and 60 meters, the Target Face of 122cm shall be used. For the distances of 50 and 30 meters, the Target Face of 80cm shall be used.

NOTE: FITA and advanced metric rounds will be shot over a period of four consecutive days at the National Wheelchair Games, if Double FITA is shot.

For two-day games, a single FITA shall be shot each day. You may also only shoot a single FITA over two days.

6.6. Juniors will shoot based upon gender, age division, classification, and type of equipment. Definitions include:

- **AR1 COMPOUND:** Archers using a compound bow with a mechanical release in sitting.
- **AR1 RECURVE:** Archers using recurve bow with a mechanical release in sitting.
- **AR1 COMPOUND BOWSTAND:** Archers using a compound bow with a mechanical release in sitting but need a devise to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.
- **AR1 RECURVE BOWSTAND:** Archers using a recurve bow with a mechanical release in sitting but need a devise to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.
- **AR2 COMPOUND:** Archers using a compound bow shooting, sitting.
- **AR2 RECURVE:** Archers using a recurve bow shooting with fingers, sitting.
- **AR2 COMPOUND BOWSTAND:** Archers using a compound bow with a shooting with fingers in sitting but need a devise to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.
- **AR2 RECURVE BOWSTAND:** Archers using a recurve bow with a shooting with fingers in sitting but need a devise to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.
- **AR3 COMPOUND:** Archers using a compound bow shooting,

standing.

- **AR3 RECURVE:** Archers using a recurve bow shooting, standing.
- **AR3 COMPOUND BOWSTAND:** Archers using a compound bow with a shooting with fingers in standing but need a device to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.
- **AR3 RECURVE BOWSTAND:** Archers using a recurve bow with a shooting with fingers in standing but need a device to hold the bow. Archers must **not** have the physical function to hold the bow in an extended and stable position.

7. JUNIOR RECORDS

- 7.1. Junior National Records can only be established at the National Junior Wheelchair Championships. Junior National record applications are to be made on Junior National Record Application forms as provided by the National Office. The original is to be forwarded to the National Office with copies to the designated Archery NGB representative and the Junior Statistician. Applications must be complete. Applicants must be members of WASUSA and Archery at the time of the performance.
- 7.2. To be eligible to compete in archery at the National Junior Wheelchair Championships, a competitor must shoot a score equal to or higher than the published qualifying standard at least one sanctioned qualifying meet. Junior athletes have from August 1 until the National Junior Championships registration deadline to meet the qualifying standards.

9. CONDUCT AND RANGE SET-UP

- 9.1. The range should be set up to shoot all rounds at the same time on a common shooting line.
- 9.2. For the least conflict with other events, it is highly recommended that all archery events be held the first four days of the Regional and National Games.
- 9.3. Each archer shall shoot his arrows in ends of three arrows each. The maximum time permitted for an archer to shoot an end of three arrows shall be two minutes.
- 9.4. The target butt should be tilted 15 degrees with a three-degree tolerance.
- 9.5. The minimum distance between targets will be five meters, measured from center gold to center gold.
- 9.6. The center of the gold shall be 130cm (51.1") above the ground with a 5cm tolerance.
- 9.7. The recommended number of archers per target is three. However, there shall be no more than four per target.
- 9.8. A waiting line shall be indicated at least five (5) meters behind the shooting line. Suitable barriers shall be erected at least 10 meters behind shooting line to keep spectators back.
- 9.9. Archery targets should be tied down or staked down to prevent being blown over.
- 9.10. Coaching and spotting arrows IS NOW PERMITTED. However, it CANNOT interfere or distract other archers on the shooting line.
- 9.11. Archers in the quadriplegic classes (AR1) may receive assistance in putting the arrows in their bows. Coaching or conversation between archer and the coach or "helper" during the shooting of ends is permitted. However, it CANNOT interfere or distract other archers on the shooting line.
- 9.12. There will be double scoring cards used in all rounds.
- 9.13. WASUSA - sponsored FITA's will follow NAA shooting sequence.

10. DRESS CODE

- 10.1. Archers shall dress in white or blue shorts, slacks or skirts.
- 10.2. Any type of shirt may be worn as long as it is a team shirt or an archery tournament shirt.

11. QUALIFYING STANDARDS

- 11.1. An archer may qualify for WASUSA Nationals by shooting the required qualifying score at a National Archery Association registered FITA

Tournament. The archer must submit his scorecard from the NAA Tournament to the WASUSA Office and one copy to the National Games Committee, Wheelchair Sports, USA, 1236 Jungermann Road, Suite A, St. Peters, MO 63376.

12. NATIONAL RECORDS

12.1. National Records may be set at WASUSA-sanctioned tournaments or NAA sanctioned tournaments.
